



2016 RESULTS WORTH CELEBRATING

Once again our A Level and GCSE students achieved great success in their recent exams.

At A Level, 13% of all grades were A*, 33% of all grades were A* / A, and 81% of all grades were at Grade C or above. We wish all our talented A Level students good luck as they progress onto the next stage in life.

GCSE students celebrated another excellent set of results a week later. 44% of students achieved the EBacc and 72% achieved a good pass in English and Maths. The school's Attainment 8 figure (average score across 8 subjects) was 54.7, one of the highest in the authority. We wish all our Year 11 students the best of luck as they move on to sixth form or further training.

EX-PUPIL ORDAINED BISHOP

Paul Mason was born in North Shields, North Tyneside, on 6th November 1962, and attended St Anselm's RC High School (which later became St Thomas More RC High School and then Academy).

After gaining his BA (Hons) in 1986 and working in industry for a number of years, he retrained for the priesthood at the Venerable English College in Rome, obtaining a Licence in Philosophy from the Gregorian University, Rome. His first appointment was as assistant priest at St John the Baptist in Purley. From 2001 to 2012 he was a full time chaplain at St Thomas' Hospital, during which time he qualified for his MA in Medical Law and Ethics from King's College, London. From 2013, Fr Paul held the position of Episcopal Vicar for Kent.

On 23rd April 2016 it was announced that Pope Frances had appointed Fr Paul as an Auxiliary Bishop in the Archdiocese of Southwark.

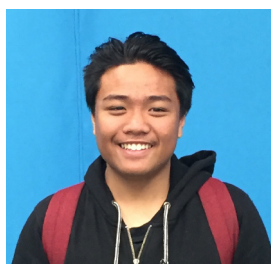
ELLEN DAVEY

BIOMEDICAL TRIP TO NEWCASTLE UNI

On September 20th, a number of Year 13 Biology students visited the School of Biomedical Sciences, attending workshops exploring real life applications of the A-Level syllabus.

Workshops included practical sessions on how body fluids can be used to diagnose diseases, the effect of drugs on enzyme activity following a mock chemical terror attack, and a crime scene investigation using DNA sampling. Students who attended the immunology session investigated the role of antibodies in the body and all found it very interesting, particularly the chance to use specialist equipment. Other students participated in a pregnancy and delivery session and enjoyed learning how specialists can determine the need for a caesarean section based on the shape of a baby's head.
