

## Holocaust Survivor Evening (





On Tuesday 24th March, students, parents, and members of the local community heard testimony from Holocaust survivor, Eva Clarke, as part of a visit organised by the Holocaust Educational Trust (HET). Eva was born in the Mauthausen concentration camp in Austria, on 29th April 1945. Her mother had previously been in Auschwitz-Birkenau. The American army liberated the Mauthausen camp three days after Eva's birth.

Students in Year 9 had previously spent a day in school learning about the Holocaust and participating in a wide range of other activities including the production of art work and music in response to what they had heard. Mr. Watson, Deputy Head said: "It is a privilege for us to welcome Eva Clarke to our school and her testimony will remain a powerful reminder of the horrors so many experienced. We are grateful to the Holocaust Educational Trust for co-ordinating the visit and we hope that by hearing Eva's testimony, it will encourage our students to learn from the lessons of the Holocaust and make a positive difference in their own lives."

# St Thomas More student becomes North Tyneside's next Young Mayor.

St Thomas More student Abbie Armstrong recently topped the polls in the election for North Tyneside's Young Mayor, securing 3,194 votes. A total of 8,012 votes were cast during the three-day ballot, representing a 63 per cent turnout.

Abbie, who is in Year 7, will begin her duties later this month. Her role will be to represent young people in the borough for a year, and she will work with North Tyneside's Young Cabinet and Youth Council to influence decisions made by the council's Elected Mayor, Cabinet and Council.

Abbie's manifesto includes looking at ways to prevent bullying in schools, providing young people with better and improved sports equipment and creating a programme to support children who are going through hard times at home. She will also be able to influence initiatives that will benefit young people in North Tyneside, and ensure that young people are consulted on decisions that affect them.



Speaking after being announced as the new Young Mayor, Abbie said: "I am so surprised, I didn't even think I'd make it to the top four! Thank you to everyone who voted for me and to my friends, family and school for all the support - it really means so much."

After presenting Abbie with her badge of office, North Tyneside Elected Mayor, Norma Redfearn said: "Congratulations to all the candidates who stood in this year's election - they were all very worthy winners. I look forward to working with Abbie and hearing more about all her plans".
