This half term has seen the launch of a major initiative to improve literacy. All Year 7 students have been enrolled onto the Accelerated Reader scheme. This matches each student with books to suit their reading age and ability. Once completed, quizzes are taken on the book and points and prizes can be earned. Here at STM we have added a further competitive element by adopting a Reading Olympics theme. Students have been winning marathon certificates for long reads, triple jumps for

three books in a series and synchronised swimming for reading the same book as a friend. This has created a real buzz around school particularly in the library where students have been queuing up to quiz.

To date over 500 quizzes have been taken and 6,621,063 words read!

YOUNG CARERS CREW CPR TRAINING

CPR is a vital skill to have because it can save someone's life. When a person suffers from a cardiac arrest, survival depends on immediate CPR. Around 90% of people who suffer a cardiac arrest out of hospital will die, but CPR, especially if performed in the first few minutes, can double or triple a person's chance of survival.

SAVE A LIFE TODAY!

Step one – place the heel of your hand on the centre of the person's chest, put the other hand on top and press hard for thirty presses (if you are giving CPR to a baby you use two fingers and press). If you are giving someone CPR you may break their ribs but broken ribs is better than dying.

Step two – place your mouth around the other person's mouth, squeeze their nose and blow three times with normal breaths.

Step three - repeat steps one and two until help arrives or the person starts breathing by themselves.


EMMA & JAMIE WALKER KICKBOXING CHAMPIONS
