
BEACH TOUCH RUGBY FESTIVAL


UNDER-19s FOOTBALL TEAM

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On 31st March 2017, the Year 7 rugby team travelled to Dame Allan's School to compete in the County 7s competition.

JUDO CHAMPIONS

On Saturday 8th April 2017 I represented St Thomas More at the British Schools Judo Championships. This major national competition has over 600 competitors, and to gain entry I had to win Gold at the regional qualifier event in Tynemouth in January.

In the National competition I fought in a new weight category of under 48kg. I won my first two fights with maximum points. My third fight was very frustrating as I was in control of the fight and leading by two scores, but was then thrown by a slightly higher score in the last five seconds of the fight.

After losing this fight I had to fight in the Bronze repechage, but I

fought well, achieving maximum points and securing the Bronze medal.

OUTDOOR ADVENTURE IN HEXHAM


