





allowed me to see that medicine is a career in which empathy with people's feelings is Cerviel CLAS required in order to provide appropriate care. Years of antidepressants had not worked for this patient, but the suggestion of community volunteering proved effective, giving the patient a sense of purpose and thus greatly improving her mental health. Two days spent with nurses on my rural placement showed me the importance of teamwork in medicine. I witnessed first hand how patient care is provided by an array of individuals, not just doctors. Therefore I feel that five years captaining a trophy-winning school rugby team have equipped me with valuable skills, such as how to lead and get the best from people. Playing for my dub has taught me to be a team player, as I learned to listen to authority and value every team member. My part time work in retail has given me experience of working with others towards a common goal.

I have recently been accepted as a volunteer at a local hospital where I will spend one evening a week for the next year on a ward. Mydufes will include feeding patients and befiending those with no visitors. This role will develop skills transferable to my medical career by enabling me to conduct myself in a more responsible, professional and confidential manner with patients. For the duration of lower sixth, I held a position of care as a reading mentor, working to improve the skills of children with dyslexia. Each week without fail, I spent two hours turbring in the basics of reading, finding it fulfilling to see their steady progress.

I am able to cope well with stress, finding that mysporting and social interests allow a good work/life balance. When faced with a large workbad I prioritise my time and work efficiently. For example during the summer exam period I decided to take unpaid leave from my job to focus on my studies.

I feel that my experience, academic performance and enthusiasm make me well suited to thrive at medical school and later in life as a doctor. I am sure that I want to spend my life practising medicine and am eager to take the next step in my education.

int me what my real values are. I am not attracted to A week spent at an investment con a career in which the overriding does. It to earn money for a large corporation. I need a profession that will give me the opportunity to have a direct impact on the wellbeing of others whilst challenging me intellectually. Medicine offers this, in addition to being a life long vocation in which I will never stop learning, suiting my inquisitive nature. My placements allowed me an insight into the variation between medical practices in different locations. Initially I spent three days on a placement shadowing GPs at a rural practice, with predominantly elderly patients. The case of a generally healthy lady with arthritic knees stood out for me as I found it interesting to see steroid injections administered and discuss the benefits. Mysecond placement was in stark contrast to this. I spent four days shadowing GPs at a city practice in a deprived area. One doctor consulted in French and Kurdish, which highlighted for me the importance of effective communication in medicine. The prevalence of joint problems within the Somali community caused by vitamin D deficiency awakened me to the social and cultural aspects of medicine in terms of symptoms and solutions. A consultation with a recovering heroin addict and her son during this placement gave me experience of an ethical dilemma. I also had the invaluable opportunity to discuss the issues surrounding methadone treatment with the doctor afterwards. As part of the school debating team. I have experience in tackling ethical problems, such as conflicts between religion and medicine, in an analytical manner.

I have a natural interest in people and their emotional wellbeing. The case of a lady with severe depression following a rape particularly stood out for me on my urban placement. It

What is the UCAS Personal Statement? Why is it important?



UCAS

The Personal Statement is a very important part of your university application, around an A4 side in length, which gives you an opportunity :

- To tell the universities and colleges why they should choose you.
- To tell them about **your suitability** for the course(s) that **you** hope to study.
- To demonstrate **your enthusiasm** and **commitment**, and above all, ensure that **you** stand out from the crowd.

 Most university courses <u>do not</u> interview so your only chance to impress selectors is in the Personal Statement

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
- Even some highly selective universities do not interview
 e.g. LSE and Durham (except for Medicine and Education)
- If you are interviewed you may be questioned about what you said in the Personal Statement

- Personal statements are checked against a library of those already in the system, and from a variety of websites and paper publications
- Each new statement is added to the library after processing

Make sure that your personal statement is your own work

We will carry out checks to verify that your personal statement is your own work. If your personal statement appears to have been copied from another source we will inform the universities and colleges to which you have applied. They will then take the action they consider appropriate. We will also contact you by email.

- <u>Guidance for using Extra</u>
 - Minimum entry requirements
 - Are minimum entry requirements
 - Achieving minimum entry requirements puts you in the 'pile' that gets considered
 - Then additional sifts are applied
 - Everyone competing for the place you want will also meet the minimum requirements.

N.B - Adjustment and Clearing

- Adjustment facility for students to re-apply if they have achieved grades higher than expected.
- Clearing facility for students to re-apply if they achieve grades less than expected



- Student_Finance
- All applications for student finance are now to be completed online Apply for finance in <u>April / May 2019</u>.
- Students (with help of parents) complete application with all the necessary information e.g. financial details.
- Once the application is submitted you will find out what finance you are entitled to within 6-8 weeks.
- More information will be provided for students in PSE lessons.







- Any institution will be able to charge up to $\pounds 9.25$ k per annum.
- No eligible student will have to pay up front for their tuition – the Government provides access to loans to cover tuition fees





- Students will only start to contribute when they are earning over £25,000
- 30-40% won't pay back full amount and debt wiped after
 30 years

North Tyneside Schools' 16 to 19 Bursary Scheme 2017/18:

• The 16 to 19 Bursary scheme provides financial help to young people aged 16 to 19 who face financial barriers to participating in education or training, provided they meet agreed standards of attendance, behaviour and progress.

• The application pack and supporting info will be available on the council website and in school.

• 2 tiered system of support.

>Tier 1 (£1200 for the full academic year)

To be allocated the **tier 1** bursary, students must be:

- In care
- Have left care having been in care for a minimum of 3 months from the age of 14
- In receipt of Income Support
- In receipt of **both** Employment Support Allowance **and** Disability Living Allowance.

Tier 2- Discretionary

To qualify for **tier 2** students must be:

- Eligible for Free School Meals
- A family in receipt of Working Tax Credit and with a gross household income of **£16,500** or less.

>Hardship Bursary

In addition, there is a fund for students experiencing hardship, severe need or emergency.

LICAS

Typically, circumstances could include:

- Family breakdown / domestic crisis
- Recent parental unemployment
- Severe financial hardship

There are **no set criteria**, such as in receipt of Working Tax Credits etc, for the discretionary fund but to assess the application NTC will need information about:

- Household income and the number of dependant children/ young people
- The particular circumstances and need for a discretionary bursary
- What students will use the discretionary bursary for

NTC will allocate Tier 1 Bursaries first before opening up the Discretionary Bursary and this means that 'Hardship' Bursaries are likely to be quite **modest payments**.

UCAS

Receipt of other support funds, such as allowances or bursaries, will be taken into account in determining any Hardship Bursary payments.

>

Applications go before a panel made up of Heads of Sixths.

The panel meets once every half term to assess applications and agree the level of financial support – this panel do not see the names of students or the schools they attend.



Free School Meals

You are eligible for help if you are in receipt of any one of the following benefits:

- Income Support
- Income-based Job Seekers Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- Pension Credit Guarantee
- Child Tax Credit without Working Tax Credit & an annual taxable income below £16,190
