Starting Year 7 at St Thomas More is very different to what we had expected it to be. All year groups are in bubbles and have to socially distance, but we have found that this has allowed us to focus on meeting new people and getting to know them better. Also, because of the bubbles we have to stay in zones, which means there is less chance of getting lost.

Ellie says, "It is bizarre having to wear a mask constantly, although I have found each individual mask shows a small part of a person's personality. I thought that wearing masks would be uncomfortable and that I would feel really silly but when everyone wears them it doesn't feel uncomfortable at all. It does however look like a flood of colours and patterns pouring out of the classrooms."

Since March we have not been able to see our friends (apart from on Facetime), so being able to see everyone again when we started school was great. At lunch we are allowed to

sit outside and there are even benches in place so that we don't have to sit on the floor. All of the changes may feel very different but it is still great being at St Thomas More.

Lexi says she is happy to wear a mask to stop the spread of Covid-19. "My life has been affected by this global pandemic and I'm sure it's the same for all children round the world. I can't visit my grandparents. Sadly some children are much worse off and may have lost a friend or family member."

Cameron has been out and about talking to members of staff about the new regulations. Michael Thompson (School Chaplain) reported that the students had adapted well to the restrictions and changes during the COVID-19 pandemic. They have got into the spirit of wearing a mask and keeping to their zones. Mrs Jones (Student Support) commented that if school did have to close again it would have a massive effect on the education of children and would be a huge disappointment for everyone after settling back into the new school routine.

# **AN INTERVIEW WITH OUR NEW ASSISTANT HEADTEACHER MRS HAGAN**

As our new Assistant Headteacher, what is your role within the school?

My new role within school involves overseeing the pastoral care of all our students from Year 7 to Year 11. On a daily basis I will be ensuring that our expectations are high and that our students meet these expectations. This will allow everyone the opportunity to reach their full potential in a calm and ordered environment, where effective teaching and learning can take place. I will also ensure that interventions are in place for any students who may face difficulties. I will work closely with Mr Flynn who is the new Head of Key Stage 3 and who oversees Years 7-9.

What is your priority for this year?

My main priority this year will be to see STRIVE embedded. Our ethos states that we want all of our students to strive to be the best they can be. Therefore our expectations this year are based around this:

- S Standards of uniform
- T Timeliness
- R Respect
- I Independent Learning (Homework)
- V Value Learning (Classwork)
- E Equipment

Evidence shows that students who arrive to school with full uniform, show respect for themselves and others, complete homework on time and with effort, work well in all lessons and are prepared for the day ahead will be successful in school and then will go on to be successful in their future. We will reward our students who meet these expectations but also intervene when some may fall short to ensure that everyone has the opportunity to strive and reach their full potential.

We have extended Classcharts so that parents can now see positive points awarded by staff but also any negative points. I hope that this will allow parents to have a clearer picture of how their child is doing in school every day.

## ARE YOU ELIGIBLE FOR FREE SCHOOL MEALS?

If you feel you may be entitled to free school meals for your child please contact North Tyneside Council.

As well as a daily free nutritious meal for the student, the school also receives significant additional funding from central government for every child who is signed up for a free school meal. We would therefore encourage all parents who believe their child may be eligible for a free school meal to apply – even if you think this may be for only a short period of time.



How do you think the current Covid-19 restrictions are impacting on students?

The last six months have been unprecedented and some of our students and indeed staff have found the lockdown period very challenging. However, the majority of our students have been excited to return to school and have thrown themselves into all the opportunities on offer! School has seen many changes due to restrictions but our students have responded in such a positive manner and just adapted! This is great to see and many have enjoyed the new zones in school, which have allowed them to spend more time within their own year group community. This is of course vital to keep everyone safe and well. It has been wonderful to see all of our students return and I feel they are even more appreciative of the school environment after their long break. They are really settled and working very hard.



# **DESTINATIONS 2020**

This year's results were a challenge for everyone involved, and we are so proud of our Year 13 leavers for the positivity that they showed throughout the uncertainty, firstly over exams then over results and destinations. Final grades show a 100% pass rate, with 36% of grades being awarded at  $A^*/A$ , a fantastic set of results that rewards the hard work shown by a fabulous yeargroup.



Thankfully, as the map shows, we have been able to send students all across the country and beyond, and we wish them every success in this new chapter of their lives.

Bethany Taylor, one of St Thomas More's 2020 graduates, wrote that "this year's results were like a maze, with a twist and a turn after every step. For many, these challenges led them to receiving the grades they worked hard for and deserved. Meanwhile, it wasn't all happy faces on results day. Luckily, after a stressful few days and a government u-turn, most got where they wanted to be. Each of us have gone different ways, but if it weren't for the constant support of St Thomas More, it would have been a very difficult struggle." Bethany is currently working at Diesel Marine International in North Shields and is investigating joining the Royal Navy.

Sophie Dixon wrote that she can't wait to continue her language studies at Durham University. She chose to "continue studying German, after doing it at GCSE and A Level, and pair it with a beginner's course in Russian. Most importantly, I feel so welcomed at college, and look forward to exploring more of the beautiful city."

Emma Charlton probably wins the award for travelling the furthest, and has already begun a degree in Psychology with a Tennis Scholarship at the Saginaw Valley State University in Michigan, USA.

### **ANTHONY TUNMORE** 2004 - 2011

After leaving STM I moved straight into employment through an administration apprenticeship, despite achieving the grades required to attend University. I was conscious very early on that I was more motivated to begin work and continue my education there rather than spend another three or four years in formal education. After completing my apprenticeship I moved into finance, spending over 6 years in the engineering business sector, working in the UK as well as the USA. In 2018 I moved into Corporate Finance, assisting clients with financial and investment activities before being recruited by one of my firm's leading clients 'Cascade Cash Management' to head up their finance department. Aside from my work, I have continued to study; I have various professional qualifications and am currently studying for a BA (Hons) Degree in Finance Management with Derby University. What I have learned is that no one is the finished product. It is important to have the initiative to explore and eagerly greet new opportunities, new techniques and new ideas, whether that be within the education system or in a work environment.

### **ANDREW HALE** 2005 - 2012

I wasn't originally going to apply for University, but after some encouragement from my Head of Year I went on to study Business with Marketing at Northumbria University. I graduated with a first in 2016 and spent a year travelling Australia, working in everything from Human Resources to odd job man in Sydney, Perth and Melbourne. Since 2017 I've been the Learning and Development Coordinator for the British Engines Group; a large engineering company based in Newcastle. I manage the company apprenticeship scheme of over 100 apprentices and lead on training and development for about 1400 staff. I also manage our schools programmes, getting

young people interested in STEM and apprenticeships.

### **ALEX KEMPSTER** 2006 - 2013

I played for Whitley Bay FC during my Sixth Form at STM, where I studied Btec PE and Business, passing both to be accepted onto an Applied Sports Science with Coaching at Northumbria University.
