At St Thomas More Catholic High School we are committed to and passionate about helping our neighbours, whether they are local to us or part of our global community.

Following recent events in Afghanistan, with the help of staff in school as well as many local businesses, our Sixth Formers organised a fundraising event to raise money for all those who have had to flee their homes and take refuge with us here in the UK. The event took the form of a 'Pop up shop' and 'Luxury tombola' in the Events Suite at Whitley Bay Ice Rink; it was a real community effort, with students past and present coming together, all to raise money for a cause close to the hearts of so many.

The overwhelming success of the day raised a total of £1879.24. This money has now been donated to helprefugees. org, with all remaining clothing parcelled up after the event and donated to St Vincent's Centre Newcastle, who also help refugees. The success of the day wouldn't have been possible without the generosity of so many local businesses, some of which are owned by exstudents, and of course our wonderful Sixth Formers.

RESULTS 2021



We are hugely proud of the amazing results of this year's students, despite all the challenges that they have had to face since starting their time at Sixth Form. Below is a selection of their achievements:

Three of our students were successful in their applications to Oxbridge universities. Our hugely successful Languages department are once again proud that two of their students have secured their place at Oxford. Niamh Scott will read French and Beginner's Italian whilst Reicela Reinkopa will read German and Beginner's Czech (with Slovak), also at Oxford. Alexander Adderley achieved 4A*s in Biology, Chemistry, Maths and Further Maths and will read Natural Sciences at Cambridge.

Three students are about to embark on Medical degrees. Shruthi Sathish and Annie Johnson will study Medicine and Surgery at Newcastle and Lancaster respectively. Dana Buendia is heading to Manchester to read Medicine. These girls were also responsible for setting up St Thomas More's first ever Medical Society this year, with the primary goal of helping younger peers apply for Medicine. Shruthi, with 3A*s, also achieved one of the highest scores in the country in her BMat Admissions test. Three further students, Thomas Ferguson, Lucas Robinson and Melvin Cherian, hope to start their Medical degrees next year.

One of our highest performing students Daniel Borg, with 4A*s in Chemistry, Physics, Maths and Further Maths plus an A* in his EPQ, is looking forward to starting his degree apprenticeship with Johnson Matthey, Teesside. Eve Stanners, who achieved 3As, has secured an apprenticeship with the NHS. Nathan Lee is delighted to have successfully obtained an Events and Booking apprenticeship with Tynebank Brewery, having achieved a Distinction* in Music Performance.







Our Btec students have had another incredibly successful year, with Hannah Blackburn securing two Distinction*s in Health and Social Care and another in Sport. Thomas Griffin and Jack Savage both secured three Distinction* s in Btec Sport. All students have been accepted into their first choice of Northumbria University.

Overall we are absolutely delighted for all of our wonderful A Level and Btec students. They are an exceptional group of young people who continued to work hard and stay committed to their studies despite the pandemic. Their tenacity and talent has afforded them this success and a bright future - and they thoroughly deserve it.




ROSIE RICE 2012 - 2019





Rosie Rice is currently studying Geography at Cambridge University. This summer she took part in an internship with GeoTenerife. During her time on Tenerife, one of the other Canary Islands, La Palma, started erupting. Rosie was lucky enough to be given access to this volcano, working with the local teams to report live on Instagram and through Social Media.

On Monday 27th September, our Year 13 Geographers, at the time doing their own fieldwork in the Lake District with Mr Murray and Mrs Law, were lucky enough to catch up with Rosie live from Mirador El Time, a viewpoint overlooking the Cumbre Viejo volcanic eruption, and were able to put their questions directly to Rosie about



her experience of the volcano and the impacts that she has seen. Later the same week, this opportunity was opened up to students further down the school to ask their own questions. See www.stmacademy.org.uk for more.

Rosie is in the preliminary research stage of her undergraduate dissertation, which was going to be on an historical eruption of a volcano in North Korea. However, in the days she spent on La Palma, she changed her title to study the changing risk perception of the people of La Palma, based on the interviews she conducted with local people. Rosie has now returned to Cambridge to continue her undergraduate degree.
