# AWARD FOR FRAU WAKEMAN



On Thursday 30th June Frau Wakeman and Frau Fisher travelled to London as guests of the German Ambassador at his residence in Belgravia. Frau Wakeman had been nominated for a German Teaching Award. The afternoon started with a welcome from Miguel Berger, the German Ambassador to the UK. This was followed by an entertaining speech by Neil MacGregor, former director of the British Museum and author of Memories of a Nation, a book about

German history. He talked about the importance of language learning and the cultural benefits it brings.

The award ceremony followed and Frau Wakeman won the Lifetime Achievement Award, which was presented by the German Ambassador. German snacks, including Wurst, Pretzel and Bier were then served in the garden.

Frau Wakeman retires this summer and this award is a recognition of her dedication to German at St Thomas More. Frau Wakeman has been the ultimate ambassador for German and her commitment to the German Exchange programme has given hundreds of students the opportunity to visit Germany, experience the culture and to form lifelong friendships.

We thank you Frau Wakeman for everything you have done for German at St Thomas More and we all wish you a happy and well-deserved retirement.

Mr Watson added that Frau Wakeman "has been an inspiration to countless pupils and colleagues during her 26 years at St Thomas More. She is passionate that young people should learn about the language and culture of Germany and for many years supported and then led our German exchange programme. I cannot think of someone more deserving of such an award."

He founded the Youth Ministry Team at the request of Bishop Ambrose in 1994 and he went on to set up the Youth Village where we have enjoyed many years of school retreats since it opened in 2004 for day retreats and 2010 for residential retreats. Through YMT's gap year programme he also

developed generations of youth leaders who are now placed all over the world with many working in teaching and Chaplaincy. He will be a huge miss, both personally and for our Diocesan youth ministry.

We pray for his family and friends at this difficult time. Some of Dermott's nieces and nephews have come through St Thomas More, and so we remember them and their families in our prayers at this time too.

Eternal rest, grant unto him O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon him. May he rest in peace, Amen.

# THIS IS THE DAY THAT THE LORD HAS MADE, LET US REJOICE AND BE GLAD IN IT! FEAST DAY RETURNS



On the 23rd of June 2022 St Thomas More celebrated it's annual feast day. A Mass was held at St Columba's Church in Wallsend, followed by a BBQ and games. This was the first event that has taken place since 2019, and it was fantastic to see everybody back together again after so long. This year's theme was "This is the day that the Lord has made, let us rejoice and be glad in it!" (Psalm 118:24).



A group of students went to the church throughout the school day to practise and prepare for the celebrations. There were lots of different jobs to do such as, setting up the orchestra and the band, practising readings, taking items from school into the church hall for after the service, rehearsing the dance and sign language performances, and helping out by setting up the altar for the service.

A group of Year 7 girls learnt and performed sign language to the final song in the service, "Joyful Joyful" by Brenton Brown. They volunteered their time to learn the song. Many of the girls had never learnt sign language before and it was a new experience for them. They thoroughly enjoyed it and learnt a lot, not just the signs, but about the language, how it is used, why it is used, the different formats, supporting people who use it, and how to communicate more effectively with the deaf and hard of hearing communities.

We signed the song in Sign Supported English, meaning we used the signs of British Sign Language, with the grammar of spoken English, this made it easier for the congregation to follow along.

After the Mass, the congregation piled out into the bright sunshine and enjoyed some food and entertainment as well as having a chance to chat to students about all the work and opportunities that take place at St Thomas More. It was great to be back at St Columba's for our Feast Day celebrations and we can't wait for next year!

## **SPORTS DAY RETURNS**



























#### **MATHS CHALLENGE**

In April, 120 students from Years 7 and 8 took part in the UK Mathematics Trust Junior Mathematical Challenge. 37 students achieved a Bronze award, 20 a Silver and 6 students achieved a Gold award. Elliot Marlborough (Year 8) scored enough marks for him to be invited to take part in the next round, the UKMT Junior Kangaroo, where the questions are even more challenging. Elliot scored 108 out of 135, and achieved the highest possible award of a Merit. This meant he was in the top 25% of all students who competed in the Kangaroo. A great achievement!

#### **MATHS CONFERENCES**

On Tuesday 21st March, two teams of Year 10 students took part in the nationwide Maths Feast. Tensions rose throughout the competition and going into the final round the two STM teams were split by a single point. A final round of Maths Relay saw us pour our Maths knowledge into our answers; the atmosphere was extremely tense! With first place going to one of the other schools, the two STM teams came joint second! The organiser announced that we had scored higher than many teams around the country, even ones who had won their regions. # STUDENT ACTION PRODUCES RESULTS

#### ARRIVA 'FAIRER FARES' CAMPAIGN

In the last newsletter, we reported that we were working on getting Arriva to meet with us to discuss how we could get a set fare of £1.20 for 16-19 year olds in Tyne & Wear in line with Stagecoach, Go North East and the Tyne & Wear Metro. Currently, Sixth Form students have to pay an adult fare on Arriva buses.

After months of trying, Arriva finally agreed to meet with us, and on July 12th students were thrilled to meet Kim Purcell, Commercial Director for Arriva North East. Students – along with other adults from across the Tyne & Wear Citizens Alliance – travelled to the Arriva depot in Newcastle in fancy dress (wearing their parents' work clothes or 'occupational dress' to show that whilst we look ridiculous dressed as adults, Arriva continue to treat us this way!) ready to sing some nursery rhymes.

The meeting was a huge success – the beginning of a good working relationship with Arriva has been formed – and we look forward to working on the issue of fairer fares over the next few months. Watch this space!

#### STUDENT COUNCIL

On 18th May 2022, the Student Council requested to present to the Leadership Team on their work this year. The Student Council presented four key proposals in response to wider pupil feedback. ### **KATHLEEN MALPAS 2010 - 2017**



Since leaving St Thomas More I have been working towards my undergraduate degree in Psychology (specialising in experimental psychology) at Northumbria University. I have had the opportunity to complete a research internship alongside an esteemed member of staff at the university, investigating victim-blaming tendencies within the LGBTQI+ community in the context of anti-LGBTQI+ hate crimes. I have successfully constructed and administered my own Stroop Test simulation and online survey, and with an extensive knowledge of data and statistical analyses from my advanced statistics modules, this could possibly result in a future publication.

Outside of academia, I have worked part-time in retail, alongside my closest friend Kurt Nicholson-Marshall, who also attended both my primary

school and St Thomas More. We both cherish our time at St Thomas More, and frequently recall our memories from our high-school experiences which have helped shape us into the adults we are today.

## **EXAMPLE MYERS** 2004 - 2011

After leaving STM, I studied medicine at Oxford for 6 years, gaining 2 degrees (1st class BA in Medical Sciences, and BMBCh) in the process. I have also published scientific research papers in multiple journals. I decided to head back up north after finishing uni, and practised medicine in the Highlands of Scotland for 2 years, then started specialising in psychiatry. After all of this, I decided I wanted to change career! In August, I'm going back to university to train as a secondary teacher, which I'm really looking forward to.
