Sixth Form students enjoyed great success in their A Levels with excellent performances across all subjects. 48% of all grades were A* or A, 90% A*-C and the average grade was a B. 31 students achieved three or more A/A* grades, which was almost a quarter of the yeargroup.

Students have been successful in gaining university places including Oxford, Cambridge and Russell Group Universities as well as moving on to employment and higher-level apprenticeships.

Head of Sixth Form Mrs Hallam said "We are immensely proud of our students this year. Their hard work has resulted in a fantastic set of results and most have secured their first choice of university or desired apprenticeship placement. They can all look forward to a very bright future!"

Year 11 students also enjoyed a lovely morning back in August, collecting their fantastic results, enjoying great success in both their GCSEs and BTECs. Most have returned to join the STM Sixth Form where they are enjoying continuing their studies.

Headteacher Mr Watson said, "Our students and staff have worked so hard and they have been rightly rewarded for their great efforts. With grades falling nationally and regionally it certainly looks like we have again bucked the trend with results as strong as they have ever been."



CYBER BULLYING WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW



"Bullying is when individuals or groups seek to harm, intimidate or coerce someone who is perceived to be vulnerable" (Oxford English Dictionary, 2021).

It can involve people of any age, and can happen anywhere – at home, school or using online platforms and technologies (cyberbullying).

This means cyberbullying can happen at any time.

Cyberbullying or online bullying can take many forms.

- Excluding a child from online games, activities or friendship groups
- Sending threatening, upsetting or abusive messages
- Creating and sharing embarrassing or malicious images or videos
- 'Trolling' sending menacing or upsetting messages on social networks, chat rooms or online games
- Voting for or against someone in an abusive poll
- Setting up hate sites or groups about a particular child
- Creating fake accounts, hijacking or stealing online identities to embarrass a young person or cause trouble using their name.

Indicators that a child could be experiencing bullying include:

- being reluctant to go to school
- being distressed or anxious
- losing confidence and becoming withdrawn
- having problems eating and/or sleeping
- having unexplained injuries
- changes in appearance
- changes in performance and/or behaviour at school.

You may notice that someone isn't spending time with their usual group of friends, has become isolated or that other children's behaviour towards a child has changed.

If you have a concern about bullying, you should follow the <u>school's anti-bullying procedures</u> as soon as possible.

If you think a child is in immediate danger, contact the police on 999. If you're worried a child is at risk of serious harm but they are not in immediate danger, you should share your concerns.

- Follow the school's child protection procedures (see above).
- Contact the NSPCC Helpline on 0808 800 5000 or by emailing help@nspcc.org.uk. Trained professionals will talk through your concerns with you and give you expert advice.
- Contact your local child protection services. Their contact details can be found on the website for the local authority the child lives in.
- Contact the police.
