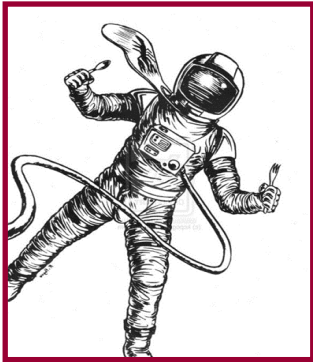


Lourdes Ball

The group are grateful to The Catenians who kindly subsidised the travel costs of the students getting to Lourdes through their bursaries. One of the major events will be the Trust mass celebrated by Cardinal Vincent Nichols to commemorate the 60th anniversary of the HCPT, during which ex-student Rachel Thornton will be the lead vocalist.



Space Seeds



Thanks to Mrs O'Neill the school is set to receive 100 seeds that have been up in the International Space Station, with Tim Peake, for an investigation into how microgravity affects growth. Two classes of Year 7s and a Year 8 class are going to take part in looking after them when they arrive next half term. The seeds came back down to Earth this month when Scott Kelly returned from the International Space Station. The out-of-this-world, nationwide science experiment will enable the students to think more about how we could preserve human life on another planet in the future, what astronauts need to survive long-term missions in space, and the difficulties surrounding growing fresh food in challenging climates. Mrs O'Neill, stated that "We are very excited to be taking part in Rocket Science. This experiment is a fantastic way of teaching our students to think more scientifically and share their findings with the whole school and wider community."

Maths Challenge

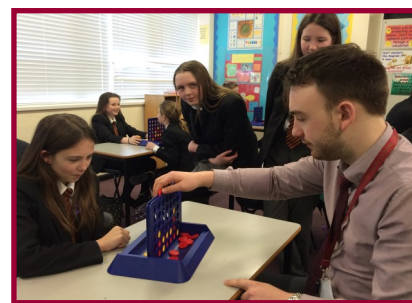

They competed in four different tasks; a crossnumber, a group challenge, a time trial and a relay and finished 5th overall out of 23 schools. They received a special mention for achieving the highest points in the crossnumber challenge as well.

Vienna



Thirty Year 13 Psychology students travelled to Vienna for 3 nights to visit the Sigmund Freud museum. Whilst they were there they also visited the burial crypts of St. Michael's Cathedral, and the world's oldest zoo. Some students even managed to fit in a trip to watch a football match. The whole group traveled to Mauthausen concentration camp, and students commented that the visit was their over-riding memory of the trip. One evening was spent at Europe's largest outdoor ice-rink and their last day included a visit to the Narrenturm, a former mental institute which has since been used to house medical preparations for the purposes of training. The trip was one of the most memorable the Psychology department have ever run, with the enthusiasm of the students enhancing every trip and excursion.

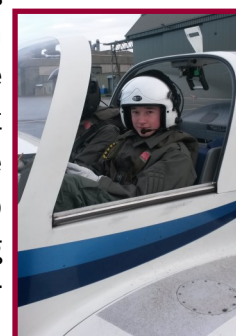
Year 9 Bake Off
