SCHOOL-BASED COUNSELLING CAMPAIGN GOES NATIONAL!

The Tyne & Wear Citizens Schools-based Counselling campaign, recently adopted as a national campaign by the National Citizens UK institution, seeks to get fully-accredited counsellors into all schools across England, bringing schools in line with their counterparts in Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland. The campaign started from pupils in St Thomas More when they were asked "What works well for you in terms of your mental health?" Without a counsellor, school staff who aren't necessarily trained to degree level would only be able to try and tackle the student issue

themselves, or go on to refer to CAMHS where there are waiting lists for up to 2 years.

With a school counsellor, students who can't be helped by their teachers and who can't access CAMHS, would be able to be seen in the comfort of their own school during the school day. We are very lucky to have a full-time school counsellor at St Thomas More, and our students are very passionate about making this a reality for all schools in the country.

CHILDREN'S MENTAL HEALTH WEEK

Children's Mental Health Week took place at the beginning of February and our Mental Health Action Team – made up of pupils from across all year groups in the school – planned two actions around the theme of "My Voice Matters".

The first was a whole school PSHE session completely planned and facilitated by our students using Google Meet. The lesson contained activities exploring three statements linked to positive mental wellbeing: "Get Talking", "You Are Not Alone" and "Every Problem has a Solution".

Our second action of Children's Mental Health Week, was a Mental Health March to the office of our constituency MP, Sir Alan Campbell. We wanted to thank him for his support of our Schools-based Counselling Campaign and to ask him



to keep it on the agenda for the Labour Party in the run up to the next General Election. A group of students from Year 7 up to Year 13 walked in the pouring rain from St Thomas More to his office in North Shields town centre to meet with him and share our walk mantra: "Mental health matters! Counsellors are important!"



CONVENTION OF THE NORTH

Last month, a group of students from the Mental Health
Action Team attended the Convention of the North at the
Royal Armouries Museum in Leeds. They were the only
young people representing the North East of England. The
team engaged with powerful figures including MPs, Mayors,

MY CLIPPER ADVENTURE by MRS ROBERTSON

Now that I have had some time to reflect on my fabulous trip I am still struggling to believe it really happened. On arriving in Cape Town in early November, I was swept up in the excitement of being part of the Clipper fleet; we had the opportunity to take in all the tourist attractions such as going to top of Table Mountain and make the sobering journey to Robben Island. Once I had completed my refresher training it was time to board the boat and set sail across the Southern Ocean. This is the most remote ocean on the planet, where outside of my crew mates the nearest companions were on the International Space Station.



We had a reasonable first week and enjoyed good winds but the second week brought the big seas of the notorious 'Roaring Forties'. The ocean swells were bigger than buildings and wind speeds reached 70 mph. As we continued to sail South and approach the ice line, we all battled with the challenges of 24 hour watch keeping and living on a 70ft boat with 22 other people. The camaradie was fantastic and everyone supported each other to keep ourselves safe, well fed and motivated. The days sped by and we were delighted to find ourselves in 3rd place as we changed course to head North and began to enjoy some warmer weather. I have memories of the night watches where I had to be on deck as waves crashed over our heads but I



also have memories of sunny days on deck where the sailing was easy and we played music and ate endless quantities of biscuits.

22 days after we set sail, our arrival in Fremantle, Australia was unforgettable and very emotional. My daughter was waiting to greet us along with many other supporters. Our podium finish of 3rd place gave us plenty to celebrate in the week that followed. I had mixed emotions as I waved the fleet off to start the next stage of the Round the World Race; my time on Dare to Lead tested my resilience to my absolute limits so part of me was relieved to be staying on dry land but I was a little wistful that my adventure was over. - Mrs Robertson, History

Dan introduced our students to his diverse range of books, from Viking revenge adventure 'She Wolf' to thrilling sci-fi mysteries like 'Boy X' and the war-time ghost story set in the North East 'Nisha's War'. Year 7 students then asked Dan questions for over 15 minutes, showing how much they enjoyed his talk.

Dan then went on to lead an hour-long workshop with 30 keen creative writers from Years 7 and 8, who had gained a place in the workshop by writing 'what happened next' in the opening chapters of a range of Dan's books. Our students hugely enjoyed Dan's writing prompts and the discussions he led.

Dan said after the creative writing workshop, "The group had lots of brilliant ideas, were willing to have a go, and did some excellent writing. You can definitely be proud of them all."


Well done to all of Year 7 for making our visitor feel so welcome, and especially to our creative writers for taking on this opportunity with wonderfully positive attitudes.







RECOMMENDED BY STAFF:

Mr Miles recommends 'Fake' by Ele Fountain: I'd recommend this book because it is a compelling exploration of truth, identity, and the power of determination. If you like stories about the power of technology, ethical dilemmas, and life-saving secrets you'd particularly like this book.

Mr Joyce recommends 'Mosi's War' by Cathy MacPhail: This is an easy read on a difficult, thought-provoking subject. The chapters are short which makes it ideal for the start of lessons. It is about a Somalian boy who is seeking asylum in Glasgow when something sinister happens. Mosi and his friend Patrick must decide what to do!

Miss Dalrymple recommends 'The Memory Cage' by Ruth Eastham: Once I started reading this book, I couldn't stop. There are so many different threads to the story, Alex's relationships with his brother and Grandad, the family secret, Alex's past, they all weave together beautifully. An emotional rollercoaster of a book.

Mrs Szoltysek recommends 'The Boxer' by Nikesh Shukla: I warmed instantly to the main character who has a lot going on in his life and who turns to boxing to help him find out who he is. Chapters are short and it was a definite page turner. I'm not particularly a boxing fan so don't let the title put you off. This is so much more than a book about boxing.

Mrs. McCabe recommends 'The Battle of Cable Street' by Tanya Landman: As a teacher I love what the author says at the start of the book... 'Facts are itchy, awkward things that can make you feel sweaty and uncomfortable. If I've learned one thing in my life it's that most people prefer pretty lies to ugly truths. But maybe you're not like most people. Maybe you're one of the brave ones?' I want my students to be brave and face facts head on!
