MEETING WITH EDUCATION SECRETARY BRIDGET PHILLIPSON

this without political bias and encouraging independent thought.

Students from Houghton raised concerns about community safety, and Phillipson promised to act. Other discussions included racism and misogyny in schools, with Mr Joyce from our school stressing that while the curriculum is improving, mindsets still need to change. After speaking about this, the Education Secretary did say that she would consider it.

The structured format of the meeting kept it focused and approachable. Overall, the experience deepened my understanding of local issues and the importance of youth involvement in shaping solutions.

A LEVEL BIOLOGISTS SURVEY LOCAL ECOSYSTEMS



On July 10th and 11th, Year 12 biology students undertook fieldwork to study biodiversity in different habitats. At Brown's Bay, we surveyed seaweed coverage and measured limpet height on rocks to see if it varied by their position. The next day, at Plessey Woods, we took freshwater samples, measuring factors like pH, temperature, stream width, and speed. We also did kick sampling to collect and identify stream organisms. Afterwards, we analysed the data with T tests and chi-squared tests to compare biodiversity between sites. - Annabelle Office and Sophia Cattan, Year 13




WORD MILLIONAIRES

CAREERS

7S ON THEIR AI WORKSHOP



This term, BAE Systems, the Royal Air Force, and the Royal Navy visited our school to deliver an engaging theatre roadshow celebrating STEM and future careers. The 2025 theme was Artificial Intelligence (AI).

The presentation showed how AI is transforming the world, highlighting its potential as an exciting tool. It explored real-world applications, the importance of human skills, as well as how to spot deepfakes and recognise risks.

Students discovered how AI can support learning for both teachers and pupils, with Lexi the robotic dog as a clear highlight. Year 7 enjoyed the interactive demonstrations promoting the safe, positive use of AI.

Here's what students from 7S said:

"I found the robot dog really cool and didn't realise how many engineering jobs link to Al."

"It was fun and interesting. The dog and the song were great, and I was surprised by how much AI can do."

The roadshow inspired Year 7 to think about the exciting opportunities AI could bring to their future careers.

SUPPORTING YEAR 11 STUDENTS WITH POST-16 PATHWAYS

As Year 11 students approach their GCSEs, many are starting to think seriously about their next steps. This can be both exciting and overwhelming, with a wide range of routes available after Year 11. Parents, carers, and school play an important role in helping young people make informed choices.

Main options after Year 11:

- SIXTH FORM Staying on at school or moving to another sixth form allows students to continue academic study, often taking A levels or equivalent qualifications. It's ideal for those who enjoy academic subjects and may consider university.
- COLLEGE Further Education Colleges offer A levels, T Levels, and vocational courses in a more independent environment, helping students prepare for higher education or employment.
- APPRENTICESHIPS These combine paid work with study, allowing students to gain qualifications and real-world experience across many industries.
- TRAINEESHIPS Short programmes that build skills and confidence, for those aiming to progress into apprenticeships or employment, especially useful for improving English, Maths, or work-readiness.

How parents and carers can help:

- Talk with your child about their interests, strengths, and ambitions.
- Encourage research into different pathways and attend open evenings together.
- Use resources like the National Careers Service and UCAS to explore options.
- Help them plan ahead for applications, deadlines, and interviews
- Review personal statements or CVs to build confidence.

Most importantly, reassure your child that there are many routes to success. With your encouragement and the school's support, every student can find a pathway that matches their skills, interests, and goals.

More recently, I took the leap into starting my own traffic management agency, focused on providing opportunities for those facing challenges, such as the unemployed, exmilitary personnel, ex-offenders, and people with disabilities.
